<p>Always yield to the vehicle on your right Do Not Use Outer Lane for No More than Two Exits!</p> <div style="display: flex;"> <div style="width: 50%; padding-right: 5px;"> <p>DRIVING LEFT</p> <p>When turning left:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Approach from the outer lane • Move to the inner lane • Give way and enter when there is a safe gap • Release left hand • Stay in the Outer Lane </div> <div style="width: 50%; padding-left: 5px;"> <p>DRIVING RIGHT ON MAINWAY & 2nd Exit</p> <p>When turning right or making a U-turn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Approach from the inner lane • Release left hand • Give way and enter when there is a safe gap • Stay in the inner lane • Release left hand </div> </div>	<p>Large Vehicles</p> <p>Drivers should be aware that large trucks may not be able to turn right. Therefore, when you are driving in an exit lane, check the rearview mirror through a rear window to see if a truck has a right hand roundabout as a way through to you.</p> <p>Large Trucks</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • When making a U-turn, approach from the inner lane • When turning right, approach from the inner lane • When turning left, approach from the outer lane 	<p>Pedestrian Rights</p> <p>Before crossing the roundabout, pedestrians should check for the direction of approach traffic. That is, if you are walking on the inner roundabout, look a 90° to the right for dual lane roundabouts. <p>DRIVING STRAIGHT AHEAD</p> <p>When going straight ahead:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Give way and enter when there is a safe gap • Release left hand • Release both hands and stay in that lane 	<p>DRIVING STRAIGHT AHEAD</p> <p>When making a Single / Paired Lane:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Release left hand • Give way and enter when there is a safe gap for the inner lane • Single Lane / Paired Lane into a Single Lane • Give way and enter when there is a safe gap • Release left hand • Release both hands and stay in that lane 	<p>Emergency Vehicles</p> <p>Always give emergency vehicles the right of way when they approach. If you have any way through the roundabout, pull over to the right allowing emergency vehicles to pass. Never enter the roundabout. Come to your stop and then pull over to the right allowing the emergency vehicles to maneuver around you.</p>	<p>Choose Your Lane</p> <p>Lane choice at a roundabout is similar to a standard intersection. When approaching, choose either the outer or inner lane that corresponds to your desired movement. Lane choice is based on the driver's intention. The outer lane allows right, straight ahead, emergency and U-turns only. The inner lane movement includes emergency, emergency and U-turns only.</p>
